University faculty are committed to the intellectual, cultural, and ethical development of students as citizens, scholars, and professionals. University graduates are prepared to contribute to a global society that requires leaders with creativity, integrity, and a dedication to service.

#### **UNIVERSITY PRIORITIES**

Our graduates must be able to introduce entrepreneurial thought and approaches in everything they do. This innovative spirit is also crucial to the University's fundamental role as an economic engine for the state and region.
  - Build an environment of inclusive excellence. Our students must know how to live and work in a society that is increasingly more diverse in all areas, including gender, race, ethnicity, socio-economic background, sexual orientation and religion, physical ability and intellectual perspectives. Valuing diversity is about appreciating the dignity and worth of every single human being and ensuring an open and welcoming atmosphere.
  - Strengthen interdisciplinary and global programs. We have an obligation to develop in our students a strong interdisciplinary and global perspective. The complex problems of today do not adhere to national borders or the boundaries of single disciplines. Every field must contribute its unique expertise in an integrated manner to address our greatest challenges. Recognizing the transformative impact that travel and global study of diverse cultures can have on our students, we will strengthen strategic partnerships in education, research and engagement around the world.
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
